Business owner behind bars

**First Class Wireless customers
victimized time and time again**

After being arrested in October of 2018 and released on bond the same day, David Lawton, First Class Wireless business owner, has been ordered back to the Madison County Jail following a court ordered bond revocation on Monday, Feb. 11, after Lawton was arrested in December for separate charges.

On Friday, Oct. 5, 2018, Lawton was arrested by the Remerton Police Department (RPD), in Lowndes County, Ga., on an outstanding warrant

issued out of Madison County, for grand theft in the third degree. He was later released from the Madison County Jail on Tuesday, Oct. 9, 2018, after posting a \$5,000 bond on the charges of grand theft in the third degree and organized fraud, scheme to defraud, less than \$20,000.

Over the course of several months, the Madison Police Department (MPD) had received numerous complaints in regards to Lawton, who owns First

Class Wireless, located at 177 SW Horry St., in Madison. Multiple complainants stated that after paying their bill to Duke Energy through Lawton's business, their power would later be turned off, with Duke Energy informing those customers that their bill was never paid. According to MPD Sergeant David Spicer at the time, multiple

City faced with legal landmine Adult arcade business seeks permit

The adult arcade industry has managed to continuously trudge from the murk of a disreputable past and pop up in towns and cities across the nation. The legalities which surround this industry act as a tangled nest of cords through which one slimy shop after the next manages to slide. An adult arcade, also referred to as an "internet cafe," is a facility which houses gaming machines geared towards adults. Some games involve elements of skill, while others involve elements of chance. Both award points which are usually converted into prizes such as gift certificates, coins or cash.

Municipalities and local governments across the state have attempted to ban or make allowances for such businesses. However, there are many issues to consider. Recently, the Supreme Court of Florida, in *Gretna Racing, LLC v. Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation*, ruled that laws governing adult arcades are constitutionally authorized to be promulgated solely by the State Legislature, and thereby voids all county ordinances

and other referendums enacted by local agencies or local votes by the electorate.

Despite this factor, it remains illegal to play or engage in any game of chance, with any sort of device, for money or valuable items, according to Florida Statute 849.08. Committing this crime is considered a misdemeanor of the second degree, state-wide. In addition, Florida Statute 849.16 defines illegal slot machines as machine-based games that contain "any element of chance or any other outcome unpredictable by the user." This means that, even if an adult arcade business receives its license to operate within a county or city, the owner could be held criminally liable under Florida State law if games within their facility meet the description of a game of chance. However, there is a fine line between what can be considered a game of chance and what can be considered a game of skill. How does a municipality determine either?

On Wednesday, Jan. 9, Attorney Clay Schnitker, city hall staff and a representative from the county met with Jay Davis, a Madison property owner; and Sam Shiver, a

Dickey's final season with the Cowgirls will begin at home with a game against long-time rival Taylor County High School on Tuesday, Feb. 19. The first pitch is set for 7 p.m. at Cowgirl Field.



Want to ride your golf cart in the City limits? Get your permit today!

In 2013, the City of Madison passed an ordinance allowing golf carts to operate on all city

streets at all times, without limitations, in accordance with Florida Statute 316.212. In order to operate a golf cart on city streets, however, a permit must be obtained through the Madison Police

Department (MPD).

According to MPD Lt. Heather Whitfield, 2019 permits for golf carts are now available for \$25. Operators must have a valid driver's

Use heart healthy fats in your diet

USDA Dietary Guidelines recommend choosing a diet low in fat, saturated fat, cholesterol, trans fats and using monounsaturated fats; all part of a plan to reduce your risk of heart disease. What a tall order! And, do you understand the difference between these fats? This week as part of National Heart Month, let's explore the issue of fat and ways to get more heart healthy fats into your diet.

According to UF Extension Nutrition Specialists, fat is an essential nutrient in our diets. It is a source of calories which can be converted to energy and is needed to help with the absorption of fat-soluble vitamins. The problem with fat in our diets is that we eat too much. Fats are made up of a mixture of fatty acids; they can be saturated, monounsaturated or polyunsaturated fatty acids.

Saturated fats tend to raise cholesterol levels which increase your risk of heart disease; it is recommended we limit the intake of foods high in this type of fat. Saturated fats are solid at room temperature and can be found in animal sources of food; examples are butter, cream and beef fat. The exceptions to the rule are coconut, palm and palm kernel oil, which are often used in commercial baked goods, cookies and crackers.

Cholesterol is a fat-like substance that is part of all human and animal cells. It's needed to form hormones, cell membranes and other body substances. Since the human body makes its own, you don't need extra cholesterol in your diet. Another component of cholesterol is lipoproteins; there are two types that carry cholesterol throughout our bodies. Low density lipoproteins (LDL) tend to keep cholesterol in the body while high density lipoproteins (HDL) carry cholesterol out of your body, which is a good thing. The American Heart Association suggests acceptable levels are to have LDLs under 110 and HDLs over 45 and total cholesterol under 200.

Over time, high levels of cholesterol cause plaque to collect along the walls of your blood vessels, resulting in restricted blood flow or blockages. Cholesterol is found in animal sources of food; meat and whole dairy. Usually when you alter your fat intake for saturated fats you also reduce cholesterol.

Trans fats have been in the news in recent years. They are formed when liquid oils are made into solid fats, although small amounts are found naturally in some animal-based foods. Like saturated fat, trans fats raise LDL cholesterol in blood, which increases the risk of heart disease. Manufacturers now must label their products for trans fats.

Reading nutrition labels and ingredients lists can help identify the amount of fat in a food product. The nutrition label will also list total fat—saturated, unsaturated and trans-fats. Ingredients are listed in descending order. To keep your fat intake within reason, choose foods with fat listed lower on the ingredient list. Choose foods with low amounts of fat, saturated and trans fats on the label.

Polyunsaturated fats are liquid at room temperature and do not increase cholesterol levels. Corn oil is an example of this type of fat. It is a healthier fat to use; many recipes have been developed to use this fat in baked produce such as biscuits.

Monounsaturated fats are the better choice; they are liquid at room temperature and tend to help lower cholesterol. That's right, they help carry cholesterol out of the body. Canola oil is the highest in monounsaturated fats. Other liquid oils like olive, peanut and safflower are all also high in monounsaturated fats. Remember though, all fats are high in calories and should be used sparingly.

So, now that you know the different fats, you ask, how do you apply these recommendations in daily eating habits? When preparing food, use low-fat or fat free milk, lean cuts of meat and remove the skin from poultry. Forget frying altogether, there are so many interesting low fat cooking methods; try baking, roasting, steaming or grilling. If you have grandma's favorite recipe that's high fat but you can't live without it, consider eating it less often, have a smaller portion or modify the ingredients to use a heart healthy fat.

All fats are not equal, change the type of fat you use and then reduce the total amount. Start by drastically reducing saturated fats and substitute monounsaturated fats in your diet. 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Passing Parade: *Power of One*

One lone Sheriff, out of Bristol County, Mass., has the media in an uproar. The Sheriff, Thomas Hodgson, had set himself the task of working with other sheriffs across the country, to act on issues of public safety, such as including stopping illegal immigration. He thought lobbying to increase border security was a public safety issue.

Sheriff Who Signed

As an immigration hard-liner, Neil Warren, Sheriff of Cobb County, Ga., was one of those who wrote an open letter to Congress and the President, in support of the proposed border wall. He blamed the federal lawmakers for the "continuing loss" of "innocent American lives" due to illegal immigration.

Sheriff Warren wrote: "For more than 20 years, we have been asking Congress to provide funding to stop the flow of illegal immigration and the carnage, trauma and suffering it brings to our neighborhoods." Further, Warren wrote: "As one of America's Sheriffs who is deeply committed to my oath and promise to protect my citizens and legal residents from harm, I am, like most Americans, fed up with Congress's refusal to do their jobs and fund the border wall."

The Jan. 9, 2019 Atlanta Constitution B1, article cites Sheriff Warren as saying that "criminal illegal aliens" were engaged in crime, including rape, murder and drug smuggling, citing media reports from across the country.

The Sheriff's office also participates with the joint immigration enforcement program with federal agencies known as 287(g).

Other Sheriffs

In a followup, the Atlanta Constitution records that the response from the Bristol County, Mass., Sheriffs attempt to enlist other sheriff's support for the wall was overwhelming. So numerous, in fact, that it had not been able to record even the number of responses it had received and forwarded to the White House.

Border Security

Enhanced border security, all along the line,

is a requirement if we are to defend ourselves. The Feb. 1, 2019 Washington Post 5A, told the story with this report: "Border officials seize record amount of fentanyl at Arizona port of entry."

The Arizona port of entry at Nogales, according to U.S. Customs and Border Protection officials, stopped an attempted illegal drug operation. They discovered 254 pounds of powder and pills hidden in an interstate truck, hauling cucumbers.

The load was enough for more than 100 million lethal doses of fentanyl, a synthetic opioid that has fueled an epidemic of U.S. overdose deaths. In addition to the fentanyl, which was concealed in a secret floor compartment of the trailer, border officers also uncovered 395 pounds of methamphetamine. That's 400 packages of narcotics-an estimated \$3.5 million worth of fentanyl and \$1.1 million worth of methamphetamine.

More than 70,000 Americans died of drug overdoses in 2017, a record, according to the latest available figures from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.

President Donald D. Trump has insisted enhanced border security will reduce such deaths and stem drug trafficking.

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to the State Attorney's Office. *Greene Publishing, Inc.* contacted Jeff Seigmeister, State Attorney of the Third Judicial Circuit of Florida, who informed reporters that the State Attorney did in fact issue the warrant for Lawton's arrest in reference to the complaints received by MPD.

While out on bond, Lawton was arrested again in December by the Madison County Sheriff's Office after a probable cause affidavit was filed by the MPD on Friday, Oct. 19, 2018.

According to an initial incident report filed by MPD on Monday, Oct. 15, 2018, MPD Officer J. Bennett was dispatched to the MPD in reference to a fraud that had already occurred. Upon arrival, Officer Bennett made contact with a resident of Madison who stated that she received her statement from the bank and found several charges she did not make. The victim stated that there were four charges on her account and found that they came from First Class

reports were received and information was compiled by the MPD and sent

Wireless, located in Madison. The victim continued to state that she went up to Capital City Bank, in Tallahassee, Fla., and received a copy of the transactions made on her account. She later deactivated her card.

The MPD reports that the victim detailed the following charges on their respective dates: \$650 on Sept. 28, 2018; \$975 on Oct. 9, 2018; \$1,795 on Oct. 11, 2018; and \$1,275 on Oct. 14, 2018, totaling approximately \$4,695.

The following day, on Tuesday, Oct. 16, 2018, MPD Sgt. Spicer made contact with the victim and a sworn statement was obtained. According to the activity report, the victim stated that she purchased a phone from First Class Wireless in March of 2017. In November of 2017, the victim's phone was disconnected and she notified her service provider. At that time, her bill was reduced and the victim began paying her provider directly for service. In September of 2018, the victim took her damaged phone to First Class Wireless and requested that Lawton attempt to retrieve a number of photos from the phone, while discussing the possible purchase of a new phone. The battery was dead, prompting her to leave it

legislative lobbyist working with Danny Patel, who has

established several adult arcades in surrounding areas. The individuals requested a permit from the City of Madison to establish a gaming arcade at Davis' building, which used to house a KFC restaurant.

After the meeting, Schnitker and City Manager Jerome Wyche discussed the issue with Scott Koons, Executive Director of the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council. Based on the cacophony of legal issues which surround adult arcades, the group decided it was not within their scope of responsibilities to authorize permitting of such a business. Koons brought up the inability of law enforcement to determine the legality or illegality of any machine within the business, thereby making such a facility extremely difficult to patrol. Wyche asserted that the authority to authorize permitting such a business is a determination that the City Commissioners must render.

At the City Commission meeting, held on Tuesday, Feb. 12, the Commissioners were presented with the

issue at hand. Schnitker explained the legal issues which surround permitting an adult arcade. In addition, the commissioners were informed that the city's Land Development Regulations (LDRs) and Zoning Ordinance have not kept up with adult arcade laws and would need to be changed in order to establish regulations for allowing such a business.

Furthermore, Schnitker presented the Commission with a temporary moratorium, which momentarily prohibits the city's issuance of Certificates of Occupancy and other approvals for adult arcades in the city until the Commission can evaluate and adopt regulations to adequately regulate these facilities.

It was left in the hands of the City Commission as to how to proceed next. "Personally, I don't like it, simply because the people from my neighborhood will not benefit from this; they will end up throwing their money away," said Commissioner Judy Townsend. "I'm totally against it."

Commissioner Terry Johnson added, "I'm in a position where I cannot support gambling." Schnitker reminded Johnson he would not be voting to allow gambling, should the time arise the council approves the permit, adding, "You would be deciding to allow games of

with Lawton to recharge. After returning home, the victim had second thoughts about Lawton keeping her phone and it was retrieved from the business.

According to the activity report, the victim felt that Lawton was upset with her for not purchasing a new phone. It was approximately one week after that encounter that the four unauthorized transactions from her account to the business occurred.

After consulting with the State Attorney's Office, a probable cause affidavit was completed and was forwarded for review. Lawton was arrested by the Madison County Sheriff's Office on Monday, Dec. 10, 2018, and charged with fraudulent use of a credit card and exploitation of the elderly/lack of consent. After being transported to the Madison County Jail, Lawton was released after posting a \$500 cash only bond, \$250 for each count.

After the State Attorney's Office filed a motion to revoke the bond of Lawton, posted on Oct. 9, 2018, Lawton's pre-trial release was officially revoked on Monday, Feb. 11 and he was transported to the Madison County Jail. Lawton remains in the jail without bond.

skill." Schnitker went on to say that the problem lies in the grey area between games of chance and skill and how to regulate accordingly. Schnitker asked for guidance from the Commission on which direction to take next.

The Madison City Commission unanimously approved the first reading of the temporary moratorium which will momentarily pause all issuances of occupancy pertaining to adult arcades until the Commission comes together and decides what action to take next. It was the Commission's consensus that Schnitker and Wyche look into the legalities of banning adult arcades in Madison, all together. They will present their findings at a later date.

This meeting served as the first reading of the temporary moratorium banning the issuance of occupancy and other approvals relating to adult arcades. A second and possible third reading, as well as an advertised public hearing, are required before the moratorium can be adopted. The next regularly scheduled City Commission meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 12, at 5:30 p.m. *Greene Publishing, Inc.* will announce any special meetings regarding the temporary moratorium and adult arcades as soon as dates are released.

license per city ordinance to operate golf carts on city streets. If you

wish to have a permit but have yet to apply, permit applications are available at the MPD. Proof of liability insurance on the golf cart is required to be no less than \$10,000.

Permits purchased after the month of March will be prorated by the months left

in the year. Upon receiving a permit, operators are subject to the regulations set forth in Section 316.212, Florida Statutes and Ordinance No. 2013-4. Permits should be applied to the rear of the permitted golf cart so as to be plainly visible, according to the aforementioned ordinance.

Additionally, Section 6 of Ordinance No. 2013-4 states that any person operating a golf cart under the authorization of Ordinance No. 2013-4

does so at the operator's risk, assuming sole liability for the operation of such golf cart. Traffic regulations are to be complied with as normal vehicle operators should and operation should be with due regard to safety and convenience of other motor vehicles, bicyclists and pedestrians.

Improper turn causes accident

Madison Police Department (MPD) officials responded to an accident that occurred in front of O'Neal's Country Kitchen on Tuesday, Feb. 5. Luckily, no injuries were reported due to the accident.

According to a report by the MPD, the accident occurred as approximately 11:23 p.m. Chandler Rains, 48, of Madison, was traveling westbound on Base St., in the inside lane, while Ryan Bratcher, 25, of New Port Richey, Fla., was traveling in the

outside lane. Rains attempted to make a right hand turn across the outside lane from the inside lane to enter the parking lot of O'Neal's Country Kitchen.

Rains, who was driving a 2015 Ford car, turned into the path of Bratcher's 2015 Ford truck, at which time contact was made between the two vehicles, damaging the passenger door of Rains' vehicle. The MPD stated in their report that Rains is considered the at-fault driver due to the improper right turn. Neither Rains nor Bratcher were injured in the incident.

The A, B, C & D of Medicare *Breaking down the basics and what each part covers*

Whether your 65th birthday is on the horizon or decades away, you should understand the parts of Medicare – what they cover and where they come from.

Parts A & B: Original Medicare. There are two components. Part A is hospital insurance. It provides coverage for inpatient stays at medical facilities. It can also help cover the costs of hospice care, home health care, and nursing home care – but not for long and only under certain parameters.

Seniors are frequently warned that Medicare will only pay for a maximum of 100 days of nursing home care (provided certain conditions are met). Part A is the part that does so. Under current rules, you pay \$0 for days one to 20 of skilled nursing facility (SNF) care under Part A. During days 21-100, a \$170.50 daily coinsurance payment may be required of you.

Part B is medical insurance and can help pick up some of the tab for physical therapy, physician services, expenses for durable medical equipment (hospital beds, wheelchairs) and other medical services, such as lab tests and a variety of health screenings.

Part B isn't free. You pay monthly premiums to get it and a yearly deductible (plus 20 percent of costs). The premiums vary according to the Medicare recipient's income level. The standard monthly premium amount is \$135.50 this year. The current yearly deductible is \$185. (Some people automatically receive Part B coverage, but others must sign up for it.)

Part C: Medicare Advantage plans. Insurance companies offer these Medicare-approved plans. To keep up your Part C coverage, you must keep up your payment of Part B premiums as well as

your Part C premiums. To say not all Part C plans are alike is an understatement. Provider networks, premiums, copays, coinsurance and out-of-pocket spending limits can all vary widely, so shopping around is wise. During Medicare's annual Open Enrollment Period (Oct. 15 - Dec. 7), seniors can choose to switch out of Original Medicare to a Medicare Advantage plan or vice versa; although, any such move is much wiser with a Medigap policy already in place.

How does a Medigap plan differ from a Part C plan? Medigap plans (also called Medicare Supplement plans) emerged to address the gaps in Part A and Part B coverage. If you have Part A and Part B already in place, a Medigap policy can pick up some copayments, coinsurance, and deductibles for you. You pay Part B premiums in addition to Medigap plan premiums to keep a Medigap policy in effect. These plans no longer offer prescription drug coverage.

Part D: prescription drug plans. While Part C plans commonly offer prescription drug coverage, insurers also sell Part D plans as a standalone product to those with Original Medicare. As per Medigap and Part C coverage, you need to keep paying Part B premiums in addition to premiums for the drug plan to keep Part D coverage going.

Every Part D plan has a formulary, a list of medications covered under the plan. Most Part D plans rank approved drugs into tiers by cost. The good news is that Medicare's website will determine the best Part D plan for you. Go to medicare.gov/find-a-plan to start your search; enter your medications and the website will do the legwork for you.

Are chicken nuggets your child's favorite food?

Parents with enthusiast chicken nugget fans might want to hold off from purchasing any Tyson brand Panko chicken nuggets after the company and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced on Tuesday, Jan. 29, that some of Tyson's chicken nuggets are being recalled.

Five-pound plastic packages of "Tyson WHITE MEAT PANKO CHICKEN NUGGETS" with a best-by date of Nov. 26, 2019, are being recalled due to concerns regarding a possible foreign matter.

Approximately 36,420 pounds of chicken nuggets were recalled by Tyson after it was discovered that those nuggets may contain extraneous materials, such as rubber.

The containment was discovered after Tyson received multiple consumer complaints regarding the discovery of foreign material within their chicken nuggets.

No adverse reactions or illnesses have been documented by the USDA as being caused by Tyson's recalled chicken nugget products.

The Panko chicken nuggets were produced on Nov. 26, 2018, and have been on store shelves in retail locations nationwide.

The products that are being recalled bear establishment number "P-13556" inside the USDA mark of inspection. Tyson and the USDA's Food Safety and Inspection Service are concerned that some products may be frozen and in consumers' freezers. Consumers who have purchased these products are urged not to consume them. These products should be thrown away or returned to the place of purchase for a full refund.

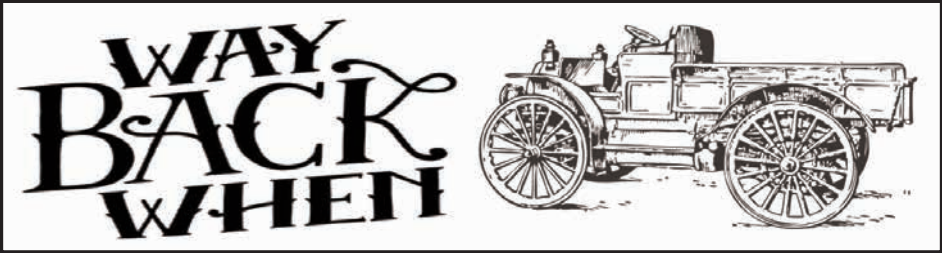

Aboriginal history

- Feb 17, 1690:** While traveling through the area, French explorer Henri de Tonti visits the Natchitoches Confederation near what is now called Natchitoches, La..

Feb 15, 1749: At Lancaster, Pa., officials of that colony and Virginia treated with the Iroquois and the Ohio tribes, making English influence paramount in the west.

Feb 19, 1778: Virginia Governor Patrick Henry is upset by the actions of several white "frontiersmen" against the Indians. They have killed Shawnee Chief Cornstalk, and four other Shawnees, who have lived in peace with their neighbors. Today Governor Henry writes a letter to Colonel William Fleming. Suggesting that perhaps the murderers are British agents trying to instigate a fight with the Indians to divert troops away
- from the Revolutionary War.

Feb 20, 1863: Pass Creek, (Walcott, Wyoming); Ute Indians attacked the Pass Creek stage station, near the junction of Pass Creek and the North Platte River, driving off stock and destroying equipment. In response, Lt. Henry Brandley and a 20-man detachment of Company B, 9th. Kansas Cavalry, rode out from Fort Halleck. They overtook and killed a few of the raiders, but Brandley was badly wounded by a ball through the left arm.

Feb 16, 1911: President Taft issues several Executive Orders which allow the sale, use or manufacture of alcoholic beverages in former Indian Reservations which have been ceded to the United States. The tribes which had ceded the land are the Chippewas of Lake Superior, Pillager, Red
- Lake, Pembina; and the Lake Traverse Sioux. President Taft also issues Executive Order Number 1299 which states that Pillager Chippewa lands in Minnesota ceded to the United States by the treaty of Aug.21, 1847, will no longer be held in trust as "Indian lands."

Feb 21, 1911: Comanche Chief Quanah Parker dies. He is eventually buried at Fort Sill, in south-central Oklahoma. His headstone reads, "resting here until day breaks and darkness disappears is Quanah Parker, the last Chief of the Comanches. He died Feb. 21,1911, age sixty-four years." Some sources say he died on Feb. 23.

Feb 18, 1945: U.S. Marines stormed ashore at Iwo Jima. Navajo code talkers used their native language to communicate by radio on Japanese troop movements.

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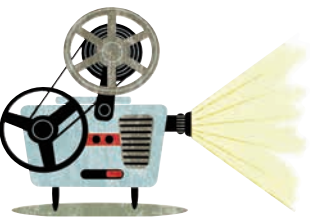
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New movies in theaters

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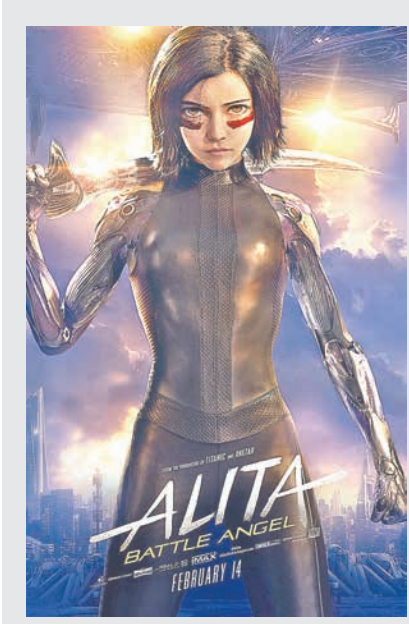

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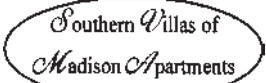

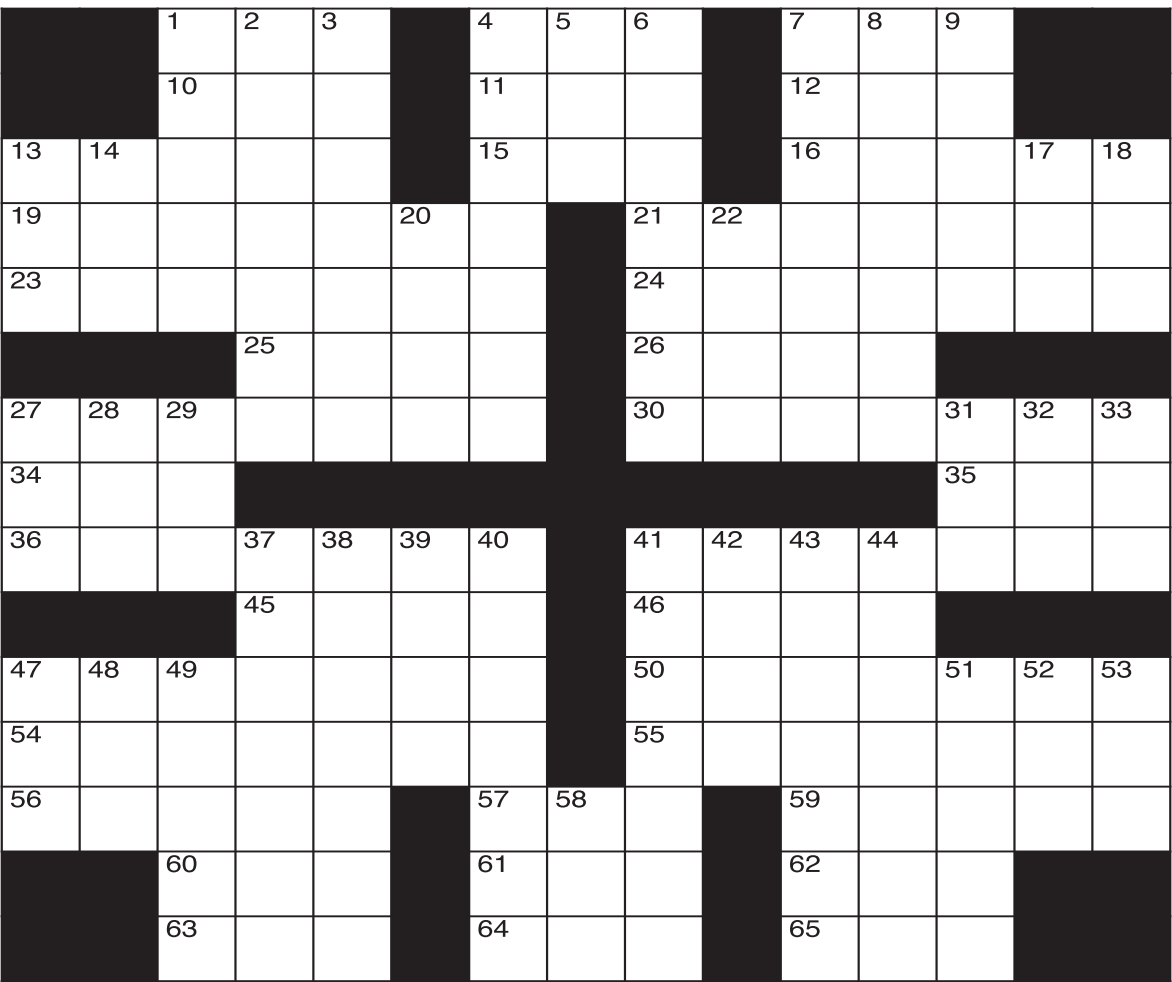
